


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

What's my school community?




Calgary has more than 200 neighbourhoods called "communities", and your school is in a community located within the city center area. Each of those communities have distinctive characteristics that make them unique. The community of Beltline (marked in dark blue in the map) is where your school is located.





What would motivate you to walk or bike to school?

- 1. Better designed sidewalks and crosswalks.
- 2. Wheel-friendly routes (e.g., protected bike lanes)
- 3. Traffic calming in school zone (e.g., lower vehicle speeds, more careful drivers)
- 4. Reduced traffic volume and congestion in the school zone.
- 5. Secure bicycle/scooter/skateboard storage at school.

These were some of your observations and safety concerns on...

13 Ave SW is the busiest street for pick up and drop off activities by parents and school buses. Also, there are no traffic signs to slow traffic.

<u>12 Ave SW</u> is very unsafe as people drive very fast. It is a congested and noisy street and it is difficult to cross. At night it is very dark.

Along 10 St SW, drivers stop in non-stopping areas and they travel fast. Also, a lot of people prefer crossing diagonally instead of using crosswalks.

11 St SW has a lot of traffic.

Did you know that walking or biking to school can help you concentrate better in class?

A recent Danish study found that students who cycled or walked to school, rather than traveling by car or public transportation, performed measurably better on tasks demanding concentration.



Walking or biking to your school is good for the environment!



The personal vehicle is the largest source of air pollution in the city. More students biking also means less cars on the road. This reduces traffic and therefore reduces pollution around schools.

Active Travel and Nature

When we dedicate less space for cars we can give more space to nature. Green ways, which are what we commonly call bike-paths and pedestrian routes, take up less space per user and allow us to introduce more natural connections in the city.
