




Do you know what the communities around your school are called? Or how many parks and playgrounds do you have nearby? Or how you and your friends travel daily to your school? Let's find out!




What's my school community?



Calgary has more than 200 neighbourhoods called "communities", and your school is in a community located in the north-east of the city. Each of those communities have distinctive characteristics that make them unique. The community of Martindale (marked in dark blue in the map) is where your school is located.

What's in the community?





Your school's community, Martindale, is surrounded by a lot of houses and big parks. The blue line of the CTrain crosses through the community. Your school is located between the only two stores in the area (they are marked in red). Martindale is home to more than 3,940 families. Would you like to know more about this community? 

Did you know that walking or biking to school can help you concentrate better in class?

A recent Danish study found that students who cycled or walked to school, rather than traveling by car or public transportation, performed measurably better on tasks demanding concentration.




Walking or biking to your school is good for the environment!




The personal vehicle is the largest source of air pollution in the city. More students biking also means less cars on the road. This reduces traffic and therefore reduces pollution around schools.

What changes would you like to see close to your school?

These were some of the things you mentioned:

- 1. Improve crosswalk intersections (at Martinbrook Rd NE and Martindale Blvd NE) adding curb extensions.
- 2. Re-design school parking lot as it is very unsafe.
- 3. Bus loading zone (in front of school, south side of Martindale Blvd NE) needs to be extended to fit all 6 buses.
